Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. 2023 Commemorative Breakfast

The Alexander-Pulaski County NAACP presented the Annual Dr. Martin Luther King Commemorative Breakfast at the St John Praise and Worship Center in Pulaski, IL. The MCs for the event, Ms Joanne Pink and Ms Lynne Chambers led and facilitated a full program of music, speakers, and presentations.

The Breakfast was catered by Ms Katrina Jones and assistants from Blaxx Smoke House.

Apostle Larry T Barnett, Sr, Th.D. began the program with a moving invocation that set an uplifting tone for the morning. Pres Tyrone Coleman and Secretary Sari-



ta Swayer led those in attendance in the Negro National Anthem and Ms Joan Floyd gave the Welcome. Moving vocal selections were given by Mr Calvin Byrd throughout the program. Recognition of those in attendance included local municipal leadership, Mayors Dean Rogan, Sr, Curtis Marshall, Sr., Thomas Simpson and Alice Madison as well as in State Congressional Representation, Sen Dale Fowler and Rep Paul Jacobs. Former US Congressman Glen Poshard was also in attendance and provided remarks on his longtime support of the area, the local branch, and his friendship with the late Congressman John Lewis. He reminded us that there are times when fighting for the rights of others necessitates getting in "Good Trouble." Heather Green offered information regarding the criminal justice system's use of the Theory of Accountability in Illinois and the impact on minority communities.

All in attendance were excited and honored to have Lt Governor Julianna Stratton deliver the keynote speech. Lt Governor Stratton acknowledged her ground breaking and glass shattering position in state leadership and her efforts and work to advocate for all Illinoisians. Her focus on reducing Food Insecurity and bringing access to fresh produce to areas designated as Food Deserts in collaboration with various groups including the University of Illinois Extension has made the Rise Up Community Market in Cairo, IL a very real prospect. The Lt Governor also has advocated for criminal justice reform and innovative efforts at Restorative Justice.

Bishop Derek Eurales and Sec Sarita Sawyer presented several awards to honor local individuals, businesses and organizations (honorees are listed on page 7-8.) on their accomplishments and success.

President Tyrone Coleman closing remarks were overflowing with gratefulness to God for His hand upon this Branch and the efforts to eliminate racial discrimination in all areas. Pres Coleman also expressed thankfulness to the many people who played a role in planning, decorating, and operating such a successful Dr King breakfast. 

Quick Facts

HISTORY

The City of Cairo lost its last grocery store in December of 2015 after serving the community for over 70 years. This left residents with no retail option for fresh food-making it a food desert. Two-thirds of the town's population travels over 30 minutes to shop for groceries at least once a month. In the spring of 2022, a group of citizens from diverse backgrounds came together to form a steering committee in an effort to create a community co-operative store. With consultation and support from University of Illinois Extension and the Illinois Institute for Rural Affairs at Western Illinois University, the group developed by-laws, policies, filed Articles of Incorporation and sought grants to launch the Rise Community Market Co-op. The Co-op is now selling memberships and shares of preferred stock to raise the remaining capital to renovate the former Subway location at 3010 Sycamore street in Cairo.

WHAT IS A CO-OP?

Unlike a traditional grocery store, Rise Community Market is a co-operative which means it is a business that is owned by the members of the community it serves. Co-operatives are independent associations of volunteer individuals working to meet common economic needs through a jointly-owned and democratically controlled enterprise. Individual citizens buy memberships which makes them an owner with a voice and a vote. In this way, customers are not just shoppers. Members have a say in how the store works. Members meet at least once a year to make major decisions about the store and to elect a Board of Directors. The Board meets often and works closely with the General Manager to monitor store operations and respond to needs. The Board hires and supervises the General Manager of the store.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership to Rise Community Market costs \$50 annually. Each member has one vote at meetings of members. Members vote on major operational facets of the store including selecting the Board of Directors, making changes to by-laws and influencing major decisions about the store's future. Membership also entitles shoppers to "patronage benefits" which includes deals and discounts based on the amount of goods and services purchased at the Co-op.

EMPLOYMENT

A few weeks before opening, the Co-op Board will hire a full-time General Manager to oversee the store operations. This position will require supervisory experience in retail operations and familiarity with inventory, personnel management, profit centers and basic marketing. The General manager will also hire a variety of part-time and full-time positions to operate the store and the deli/bakery.

TIMELINE

The Steering Committee is working toward a Grand Opening date this fall or winter. That depends upon a lot of factors including store renovations, supply chain issues, ability to hire personnel, sufficient membership and stock sales, formation of the Board of Directors as well as other business considerations. So far, we are on schedule with the major tasks of opening the store.





CANCER SCREENING



What is cancer screening?

Checking for cancer (or for conditions that may become cancer) in people who have no symptoms is called cancer screening. Screening can help doctors find and treat several types of cancer early. Examples of cancer screening tests are the mammogram for breast cancer, colonoscopy and FIT (Fecal Immunochemical Test.) for colon cancer, the Pap smear and HPV (human papillomavirus) tests for cervical cancer, the DRE (digital rectal exam) for anal cancer, lowdose computed tomography (also called a low-dose CT scan or LDCT) for lung cancer, and PSA (prostate-specific antigen) tests for prostate cancer. Screening can also include checking for a person's risk of developing an inherited disease by doing a genetic test.

Why should I be screened for cancer?

Screening can detect cancer early which is important because when abnormal tissue or cancer is found early, it may be easier to treat. By the time cancer symptoms appear, cancer may have begun to spread to other organs in the body making it harder to treat.

Individuals should discuss the cancer screening guidelines with their health care provider to determine their screening, needs.

Cancer Screening

The U. S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) is an organization of doctors and disease experts who research the best ways to prevent diseases and to make recommendations on how doctors can help patients avoid diseases or find them early. The following are the USPSTF cancer screening recommendations by age group.

A pack-year is smoking an average of one pack of cigarettes per day for one year. For example, a person could have a 20 pack-year history by smoking one pack a day for 20 years or two packs a day for 10 years.

CANCER SCREENING



What questions should you ask your health care provider about cancer screening?

- What camper screenings are recommended for someone my age?
- How often should light cancer screenings?
- Where can I get my cancer screenings done?
- How do I schedule my screening tests?
- Will my screening tests be covered by my health insurance?
- What will the screening tests cost if they are not covered by insurance?

What information should I collect for my family history?

- Who had cancer and what specific kinds did they have?
- How old were they when they were diagnosed with cancer?
- Are they still living? If not, at what age did they die and what caused their death?

How do I collect family health history information?

You can enter your family health history into My Family Health Portrait at http://kahuna.clayton.edu/jqu/F HH/html/index.html . Update It over time and print it out to share with your doctor and relatives.

Family Health History and Cancer

Learn your family's health history and share it with your doctor. Your family health history is a record of diseases and conditions that run in your family that can affect your risk of getting cancer.

Gather information about yourself and your blood relatives, including parents and grandparents, aunts and uncles, sisters and brothers, nieces and nephews, and children.

If you have a family history of breast, ovarian, uterine, or colorectal cancer, you may have a higher risk for developing these cancers. Tell your doctor if:

- A relative was diagnosed before age 50 with uterine, breast, or colorectal cancer.
- Two or more relatives on the same side of the family were diagnosed with uterine, breast, or colorectal cancer.
- A female relative was diagnosed with ovarian cancer.
- A male relative was diagnosed with breast cancer.
- · You have an Eastern European or Ashkenazi Jewish ancestry.

Telling your doctor about your family health history is the first step in finding out if you may have a higher cancer risk. It could help you and your doctor decide what tests you need to screen for cancer, when to start, and how often to be tested. Knowing your family health history also helps you and your doctor decide if genetic counseling or testing may be right for you.



FIT is not meant to take the place of a colonoscopy, but is an option for people looking for a comfortable way to screen for colon cancer.




